

SUMMARY

Bunbury Fibre Exports have requested a temporary Forestry Access Permit from Main Roads WA for Camelup and Walker Roads, to facilitate harvest of the Karringal Plantation located within the Shire of Donnybrook-Balingup. The permit application requires endorsement from the Shire of Boyup Brook before approval can be granted from Main Roads WA.


BACKGROUND

The Karringal plantation is located in the Shire of Donnybrook-Balingup, however the only access to the Bunbury port includes Shire of Boyup Brook controlled roads. Camelup Road and Walker Road are not currently on Main Roads heavy vehicle network and the temporary Forestry Access Permit would allow network 3 Restricted Access Vehicle (RAV) road trains to operate on those roads for the duration of the permit only. These roads have been assessed by the Manager of Works & Services and Works Supervisor as suitable for RAV Network 3.

A previous application for Camelup Road was rejected by Main Roads due to insufficient line-of-sight distance for trucks entering the Donnybrook-Boyup Brook Road. The new application eliminates this hazard by creating a one-way route (see figure 1) whereby trucks can enter (but not exit) Camelup road from the

Donnybrook - Boyup Brook Road, then use Walker Road, Charteriss Road, Moore Road, and Wilga Road East to return to the Donnybrook - Boyup Brook Road. Charteriss Road, Moore Road, and Wilga Road East are already RAV network 3 roads on Main Roads heavy vehicle network and therefore not subject to the requested permit. The proposed one-way route will result in loaded road trains travelling through the Wilga town-site.

Figure 1: One-way haulage route



The purpose of the temporary Forestry Access Permit is to allow Bunbury Fibre Exports the use of category 3 RAV's on the roads. No permit is required for semitrailer trucks since they are not classified as RAV's. If the permit is not endorsed by the Shire of Boyup Brook then Bunbury Fibre Exports will still be able to use the route for semi-trailer configuration trucks without requiring approval from Main roads or the Shire of Boyup Brook. This would result in a significant increase in truck movements through the Wilga town site. Figures provided by Bunbury Fibre Exports indicate using semi-trailers would approximate 15-20 truck movements through the town over the harvest duration whereas network 3 road-trains would approximate 6-8.

If the temporary Forestry Access Permit were to be granted from Main Roads, a condition of the permit (as with all RAV network use) would be for Bunbury Fibre Exports to seek additional approval known as CA07, from the road owner (the Shire). The Shire has the authority to revoke any CA07 it has previously granted and would do so if roads were being damaged by operators. It is therefore an effective means to ensure haulage companies maintain Shire roads in good condition. CA07 is not required for semi-trailers so the Shire would have limit means to enforce maintenance of the roads in this scenario.

An option to minimize use of Shire roads and divert trucks from Wilga, would be to have Bunbury Fibre Exports only use Camelup Road for entry and exit from the plantation and have them implement traffic control to eliminate the line-of-sight hazard for entry onto the Donnybrook - Boyup Brook Road. While this could be achieved as a condition of a temporary Forestry Access Permit, semi-trailers would not be subject to this permit. Advice from Main Roads WA indicates that there are no means to enforce this option when semi-trailers are used. Bunbury Fibre Exports have indicated that they would not be willing to implement this solution for RAV's or semi-trailers due to the significant additional cost.

COMMENT

The preferred option would be to have Bunbury Fibre Exports only use Camelup Road for haulage and implement traffic control to eliminate the line-of-sight hazard for entry onto the Donnybrook - Boyup Brook Road. Since this option is not enforceable by the Shire of Boyup Brook, it is recommended that the temporary Forestry Access Permit for Camelup and Walker Roads for the purpose of a one-way RAV network 3 route through Wilga should be supported for the following reasons:

- Reduction in the number of truck movements through the Wilga town site.
- Maintenance of the roads by Bunbury Fibre Exports will be enforceable by the Shire through condition CA07.

SUMMARY

The applicant, Shirley Broadhurst, has requested that the surname 'Broadhurst" be considered by the Council as a future road/street name within the Shire of Boyup Brook by the addition of John Heslop Broadhurst to the schedule of suggested names in policy P08.

BACKGROUND

The applicant forwarded the following summary for consideration:

John Heslo	<i>John Heslop Broadhurst</i> (1904 – 1984)		
•	1929 - In partnership with Mr. Tom Brockman, began farming <i>Bushley Park</i> . The farm gate was situated on Parson's Swamp Road (RMB 141) and then consisted of locations 1831 (homestead block), 1832, 1833, 1864, 2132, 2251 and 2291.

•	Played tennis both at Mayanup and Boyup Brook. Played golf at <i>Brancaster</i> (the Whistler farm, Whistler Road

 - (ii) the amount of the payment; and
 - (iii) sufficient information to identify the transaction; and
 - (b) the date of the meeting of the council to which the list is to be presented.
- (3) A list prepared under sub regulation (1) or (2) is to be -
 - (a) presented to the council at the next ordinary meeting of the council after the list is prepared; and
 - (b) recorded in the minutes of that meeting.

SUMMARY

The 2019 Local Government Convention and Exhibition will be held Wednesday 7th August to 9th August 2019 inclusive . This report recommends that Council be represented at the convention and nominate delegates accordingly.

BACKGROUND

The Local Government Convention is the premier event for Elected Members and Officers within Local Government.

The Association's Annual General Meeting is part of the convention program.

In accordance with Western Australian Local Government's constitution, member Councils are entitled to have two voting delegates. Registration of the voting delegates is generally required by early July.

COMMENT

Convention Registration generally closes early in July each year.

In previous years Boyup Brook has been well represented with at least three Councillors and the Chief Executive Officer attending.

The estimated cost per attendee could be up to \$3,500, depending on accommodation requirements and involvement with member development programs.

Whilst it is often hard to quantify the benefit of attending conferences, this annual association get together does provide the opportunity to view a range of vendors wares (ranging from equipment such as graders, backhoes and the like to computer programs, lighting, park and street furniture) and to speak at length with representatives. It also provides the opportunity to speak with other like minded people who give of their own time to serve the community. This interaction is important in so many ways as it provides a forum for sharing ideas and experiences and as such is more akin to training. The conference is generally attended by influential people in the state such as the Premier and the leader of the opposition. The President also has the opportunity to meet and greet other community, state and national leaders at a function hosted by the state Governor of Lord Mayor (these alternate each year).

Added to this is the teambuilding opportunity offered by the practice of all staying in the same hotel, incidentally where many other Council delegates also stay and so adding to the out of conference opportunity for interaction with other delegates.

SUMMARY

This report is for Council to consider a request from the Blackwood Basin Group (BBG) to, in effect, partner with them in a three (3) year rehabilitation (Watsonia weed control) and asset management program for Mayanup Reserve as follows: provide BBG with a letter supporting their Government of Western Australia Natural Resource Management (NRM) grant application; and provide: (a) access to equipment (where possible); and (b) advice on signage specifications.

BACKGROUND

At its 18 April 2019 meeting Ms K Hill (Program Manager BBG) gave a presentation to the Biosecurity Committee and spoke about a number of partnering opportunities between the Shire of Boyup Brook and BBG, and this included the BBG's proposed 2019 Mayanup Reserve NRM grant application.

In their email (dated 30 April 2019), BBG propose to put some 2018-19 Shire of Boyup Brook Community Grant funds towards Watsonia weed control in year 1 of the program.

COMMENT

Ordinarily this matter would be brought before the Biosecurity Committee, but due to time constraints it has been referred directly to Council.

Further, while Policy W.14 enables the Acting CEO to approve weed control on shire reserves by non-shire personnel, the matter is brought to Council as the BBG's Mayanup Reserve asset management program goes beyond this.

Statement

The Shire of Boyup Brook fully supports individuals, groups and organisations who wish to undertake weed control in and on Shire controlled reserves within the Shire of Boyup Brook as it recognises that it has insufficient resources to perform this weed eradication itself.

The Shire of Boyup Brook has a 'Roadside Conservation Value' report compiled in May 2013 by the DEC, which gives a summary of roadside weeds at the date of capture.

Any persons undertaking or considering to undertake weed control in or on Shire controlled reserves within the Shire of Boyup Brook must first obtain permission in writing from the Chief Executive Officer. The letter of permission must include:

- 1. Name of individual/group or organization undertaking work
- 2. Location of works including reserve number or road name
- 3. Date of works (if over several years state expected duration)
- 4. Species to be controlled
- 5. Method of Control. Include physical and chemical measures as well as details of any safety requirements that will be utilized during eradication.

The BBG's NRM grant proposal may have financial (in kind i.e. access to equipment and personnel) implications for the 2019-20 and subsequent financial years.

SUMMARY

PURPOSE

Council is requested to consider adopting revised Planning policy *P.07 Feedlots (Intensive Stock Farming),* as attached.

BACKGROUND

At its 18 April 2019 ordinary meeting of Council,

Cr Walker put a question on notice to the administration as follows:

Does the Shire of Boyup Brook have a record of any livestock feedlots within the Shire and are these feedlots operating in accordance with local laws?

Comment:

Local Laws are there to protect community interests and manage development within our Shire and a proactive approach is beneficial to the community.

Subsequently, Council request that the administration engage (Gazette, shire website, Face Book (FB), notice boards etc) with the community and urge operators of unapproved feedlots to contact the shire (by 4:30pm on Friday 31 May 2019) to commence the development approval process for their feedlots. At the time of writing this report the administration had received a number of queries from interested parties about the notice, but no development applications had been received.

Seems the public have a good appreciation of what a feedlot physically is (Angela Hales *pers comms*), but expressed uncertainty about what "... for the purpose of production ... " as cited in Policy P.07, means.

COMMENT

Policy P.07 was reviewed (refer attachment showing proposed changes highlighted in yellow) so as to make more clear the distinction between confining and feeding animals for production, i.e. finishing, and confining and feeding animals so as to comply with the *Animal Welfare Act 2002* (the Act) and its associated Regulations. Section 19(3)(d) of the Act puts onus on persons in charge of animals to provide proper and sufficient food and water as follows:

19. Cruelty to animals

- (3) Without limiting subsection (1) a person in charge of an animal is cruel to an animal if the animal
 - (d) is not provided with proper and sufficient food or water;
