## 6. BUSINESS ARISING FROM PREVIOUS MINUTES

## 6.1 Rylington Park Aeration Trials

Feedback on the aeration of the soil done by Cr King and the progress made on the installation of the fence / cage suggested at the previous meeting.

Cr King had a look at the open day, no difference visible.

Aeration works best if the ground is damp so that it holds the structure better.

## 6.2 Decision Tree

As per the Committee Resolution 23/06/001, the Decision Tree grant application has been submitted to Wendy Perdon from South West Timber Hub.

The grant has been approved and the model has been run by PF Olsen on the areas of interest at Rylington Park. The details around the figures are expected in the coming weeks. Staff are also busy obtaining comparison figures on the current income generated from the paddocks being considered for the tree planting, which will be presented at a subsequent meeting.

It is suggested that a production estimation be calculated over the past 5 years. The cost of fencing must be considered or the area left out.

## 6.6 Grass Trees & Damage Caused by Parrots

At the Blackwood Basin Group (BBG) Committee meeting held on 20<sup>th</sup> June 2023, the subject of the health of grass trees in the local area was discussed.

A large number of grass trees are in a poor state of health, with a significant number having died due to the damage being done by Australian Ringnecks, commonly known as '28' parrots. Current examples are in the bushland just south of the Mayanup reserve grounds where grass trees are in various stages of damage by the 28's.

The problem was identified over 30 years ago. From 1996-2003 the Boyup Brook Land Conservation District Commission organised grants to support the conducting of radio tracking trials of the parrots to assess feeding habits. CALM Wildlife Branch issued damage licences to farmers to control the parrots.

A 'parrot committee' was formed, chaired by a Boyup Brook resident, the late Cr Noreen Tuckett. Other attendees of the committee included representatives from the Shires of West Arthur and Kojonup, CALM Wildlife, CALM Sharefarms, WACAP, Bunnings Sharefarms, Conservation Council of WA, Greens politician the late Dr Chrissy Sharp MLC and Dr Hilda Turnbull MLA.

On behalf of the BBG Committee, I would like to request that this matter is considered by the Shire of Boyup Brook and Edith Cowan University as a research project to be undertaken at the Rylington Park Facility.

Cr Adrian Price, member of the Blackwood Basin Group Committee compiled a scope of works for consideration by the Rylington Park Committee as a potential research program for ECU at Rylington Park.

"My thought of bringing this matter to BBG and then to the Shire of Boyup Brook was to obtain DBCA regulations, advice or support regarding control of Australian Ringnecks, such as issuing 'damage licences' which were common 20 years ago, to include cage trapping or shooting, to reduce the population of these parrots. I contacted DBCA six weeks ago and am awaiting their reply. Landholders wish to know what controls are acceptable. In 1997, CALM Wildlife Dept engaged me to issue 'damage permits' to landholders in the Shires of Boyup Brook, West Arthur and Kojonup to be restricted to cage trapping or shooting. This was following my observation of farmers applying poison grain in vineyards because of the damage to growth of vines. The parrots concentrated on the vines while non-target bird species consumed the poison grain.

Regarding Rylington-ECU, the bush reserve just south of Mayanup is currently impacted by these parrots and may be an ideal research site for ECU such as:

- 1. Why some grasstrees are attacked and eventually killed when other grasstrees nearby are not yet attacked?
- Can substances be applied to grasstrees to discourage attack by parrots, though this may cause parrots to attack grasstrees which have not been treated? This was the case when wire cages were placed on top of grasstrees in the early stage of attack.
- 3. Does ECU have electronic methods of deterring parrots from attacking grasstrees without being detrimental to other fauna?
- 4. Raptors are a natural predator of these parrots, but the population of raptors have been reduced by secondary poisoning from vermin baiting. A number of the various falcons

in the SW of WA have the speed, agility, desire and ability to kill 28's in flight. Is it unrealistic to encourage breeding of these raptors, or at least, minimise secondary poisoning?"

Cr O'Connell informed the Committee that Cr Price has spoken about damage at numerous Blackwood Basin Group meetings over the last couple of years and suggested to put it to ECU for research.

Rylington Park has not been affected but farms in the Mayanup region have been damaged. Parrots tend to congregate on the edges of crops and spillage from trucks.

Prof. Brown will add it to her mapping and identify whether ECU researchers has the expertise. ECU to get in touch with Blackwood Basin Group and Cr Price.

- Set up vendors closer together to the shed:
- Put together event plans for years to come;
- Bring back to Committee in May to start planning for next field day;
- Potentially contact McIntosh to see if they can demo an autonomous tractor (active displays keep people there);
- Field day to cater to many people's needs (something for everyone);
- Remote site (5 min drive) isolating the genetics involved in the trial (biosecurity where many vehicles drive over paddocks);
- Have a bus with a presenter to have a running commentary on what is done in paddocks;
- Need to develop a way to get attendance statistics, might need to have someone on the gate.

#### **SUMMARY**

Rylington Park Scholarship is an annual scholarship awarded to Boyup Brook Year 9 or Year 10 students who commit to attend an Agricultural College in Year 11 and 12.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Rylington Park Scholarship was initiated by the then Rylington Park Management Committee Inc. as a way of promoting Eric Farley's vision to engage and support the young people of Boyup Brook in agricultural pursuits.

#### **REPORT DETAIL**

The scholarship of \$1,000.00 will be awarded to Boyup Brook Year 9 or Year 10 students who commit to attend an Agricultural College in Year 11 and 12. The scholarship provides support for the student and will ensure the sustainability of agriculture in the Boyup Brook community.

Year 10 students will receive the funding when they go into Year 11. Year 9 students who choose to go to agricultural college in Year 10 are eligible for the funding during Year 11 of their studies.

The funding will be allocated in two (2) disbursements during the year. 50% will be paid at the commencement of Year 11 and the balance will be paid at the commencement of Year 12.

To ensure the integrity of the scholarship, the Rylington Park Committee would like interested students to submit a short-written expression of interest and participate in an informal interview. Students are to write a short (200-500 word) expression of interest for the scholarship. The panel will be looking for a genuine interest in agriculture as an on-going career. A commitment to bring the skills and knowledge gained back to the Boyup Brook community at some stage in the future will be highly regarded.

Interviews will be conducted with students who will be asked questions to provide information that demonstrates:

- A genuine interest in agriculture;
- A commitment to the Boyup Brook community;
- An ability to be academically successful in the Agricultural College environment;
- Excellent interpersonal skills and values; and
- Knowledge of the Rylington Park Institute for Agricultural Training and Research and its benefit to the community of Boyup Brook.

The questions are designed to learn about each student and their thoughts and feelings on the subject of agriculture. The interviews will be informal, but the panel is looking for students with a genuine interest in agriculture who may bring the knowledge and skills that they gain from their studies back to the Boyup Brook community.

Teacher judgements will also be taken into account when awarding the scholarship.

The interview and the written expression of interest will be combined to arrive at a final assessment.
