The success of drone research and the partnership between ECU and Rylington Park Agricultural Research and Training Institute and Boyup Brook Shire is highlighted in this news item from Countryman outlining the drone and sensor research undertaken by ECU and the role of Rylington Park Farm in promoting the research.



DRONES TO HELP WITH LIVESTOCK

Drones could soon replace the need for farmers to mount quad bikes to check on stock after new camera technology research was able to identify individual sheep in clusters from hundreds of feet up. Farmers in the South West were introduced to the research by Edith Cowan University lecturer Dr David Cook at the Rylington Park annual field day at Boyup Brook in September.

Mr Cook, who was recently awarded Achiever of the Year, and co-winner of Transformative Solution of the Year at the WA Information Technology and Telecommunications Awards 2023 in August, said drone technology could soon pay dividends for farmers who were busy and needed detailed information about their flocks in real time.

He said, working in conjunction with Dr David Blake, also of ECU, who owns a few high functioning drones — and having secured some funding from the Shire of Boyup Brook — they were able to flight test the drones, worth from \$30,000-\$100,000, at Rylington Park.

“You can go down to the shops and buy a recreational drone for \$1000 and fly through the air and hopefully it doesn’t crash,” Mr Cook said. “The kinds of drones we are talking about are at a different level, we are talking about those that fly a lot higher into controlled air spaces, and are able to fly in the wind, beyond the visual line of sight at up to 70 kilometres per hour.

“They can also take a payload of up to 25kg, which will lift some large heavy camera equipment for very unique photographing, or otherwise it could be used for weed spraying or other things like that.”

With the drones they focused a part of their research on counting sheep in paddocks.

“One of the things we can do is fly a drone at 120m — we could fly lower but sheep don’t like the sound of drones and it makes them move,” he said.

“If you want to count them and do it accurately you don’t want the sheep scattering off.

“We can take great photographic images at that height.”

The images were able to pick up sheep in clusters, or against fences and other objects and identify them individually.

He said this was something that could be a challenge for the naked eye in the field, and which would give sheep producers a better understanding of what was happening with their flocks at real time.

“This is the type of stuff that is emerging — the future is coming and I think drones will play a big part in how we control the movement of sheep,” Mr Cook said.

The research included using fixed wing drones that could be used to cover cropping areas at much faster speeds and greater heights to pick out chemical application densities and issues that may be occurring with the crops.

SUMMARY

This report is for the Rylington Park Committee to receive the update on the activities at Rylington Park.

BACKGROUND

The October 2023 activity report of the Management for Rylington Park is below:

Sheep

- Crutched all hoggets
- All rams shorn
- Weaned all merino lambs
- Sold 80 wethers for \$40 each
- Sold 300 XB lambs for \$92.96
- Started feeding lambs
- Classed hoggets

Cropping

- Worked on fertiliser for next season
- Spraying thistles
- Hay was cut

Schools / Events

- Shearing school 2-6 October – had a total of 18 students at various times of the week who shored 394 white tag ewes. One lady has only been in Australia for 3 months from NZ and is learning to shear merinos; 2 ladies (1 from Scotland) working for teams and getting stands before the end of the year; 2 boys from Ag schools; 1 farmer from Mount Barker who wants to be able to shear his own sheep when necessary; young boy working in a team who will get some in-shed training before maybe coming to an advance school; a local guy working for a cocky run doing muelsing, crutching and now shearing; 2 guys from Katanning working for a contractor with the promise of stands in January; husband and wife who owns a farm in Three Springs who thought they will be able to shear their own sheep but are now happy to pay for shearing; 2 guys who weren't really interested in the school; 4 back packers for a few days each as a contractor in Frankland is desperate for shed staff.
- Shearing school 23-27 October – had 13 students who shored 346 orange tag ewes, 201 green/purple tag ewes, 160 hoggets and crutched 315 XB lambs. The 2 guys from Katanning and the local guy came back; a young 14 year old boy who goes to school 2 days a week and is in the sheds the rest of the week came with a guardian who works with him and also needed shearer training; 2 pressers who want to shear; a lady rousting in North Hampton who wanted to learn to be able to jump up; 1 ag school girl; 1 young man from Perth who worked in the sheds before and is going back first as rousty and presser; 1 guy shearing in a team who needed to learn to slow down and shear cleaner who will come to the advance school in December; 1 girl (local) and 1 boy wanting to do wool handling – the boy started in a team straight after the school.
- AWI board charman Jock Laurie, CEO John Roberts and WA public relations officer Jodi King visited the last school. Prime Super also had a chat to the students. Ethan Gellatly, old Rylington student and now one of AWI's WA Ambassadors visited both schools and shored all the rams.
- Have people in accommodation for 1 and a half weeks – fertilising for tree companies. They might stay here after the next shearing school as well.
